Training

Tips when you apply

- Get an idea of what you want (project topic, university, country) ...
- ... be flexible
- Contact prospective supervisor to show interest and ask more information
- Customise your CV and cover letter for each position
- Highlight your skills that are relevant to the position
 (programming, astronomy-related software, particular methods, soft skills)
- Highlight any research experience
- Use your DARA network to ask for reference letters
- Know that PhDs are different in different countries

Duration: 3-4 years (UK), 3-5 years (Europe), 4-6 years (US)


Format: research-only, research + coursework, research + coursework + teaching duties

Graduation requirement: dissertation thesis, number of papers

Defence format: viva, public defence, peer defence

- Perseverance is key
- Consider all options, use your network


